Bullying and harassment – a joint statement by CIfA, FAME and Prospect

Through a joint Industry Working Group, CIfA, FAME and Prospect have issued a shared statement on bullying, harassment and discrimination. You can download the statement on our <u>equality and diversity in</u> <u>archaeology page</u>.

The statement has been issued in response to sector discussions initiated by CIfA's Equality and Diversity Group at a cross-sector meeting last summer.

CIfA has formed an internal working party of its own Advisory Council to consider where CIfA should lead on equality and diversity matters and where it should play a supporting role. Advisory Council will be updated on progress with this at its next meeting and further action will be reported on in our ebulletins and in *The Archaeologist* throughout 2019 and beyond.

Prospect Archaeology Branch has launched its **Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Strategy**

The first half of 2019 has seen a steady number of successful applications at all grades. Following two Validation committee meetings so far this year, we are pleased to tell you that 30 applicants have successfully upgraded, and 60 new applicants have been accredited.

We have validated 76 Student and 34 Affiliate members. We have had 6 successful re-joiners at accredited grades and 1 NVQ fast-track to PCIfA.

We need your help with individual applications

The role of our Validation committee is to carry out a peer review process to assess individual applications against the requirements for CIfA accreditation. The committee meets at the Museum of English Rural Life (MERL) in Reading and, this year will be split between here and Birmingham.

We are always looking for new members to get involved to ensure we have a wide representation for this process. This is a benefit to applicants, but can also benefit individuals and can count towards your CPD.

You can get involved both in person, which involves attending meetings to review applications in full, or virtually, as an assessor, which involves reviewing applicants' examples of work and advising the other committee members.

It is important to us that the committee is truly representative of our members— and potential members— and we are keen to hear from accredited members of any grade.

Professional Ethics

As professionals its important that the codes (Code of conduct) and the supporting advice (Standards and guidance) we commit to adhere to don't get forgotten. We should allow time to remind ourselves what these include to ensure that the work we do still complies with our professional obligations.

In *The Archaeologist* 106, Joe Abrams from Archaeology Collective shares how he and his team use staff meetings to refresh their understandings of the CIfA Code of conduct, standards and guidance, alongside debating various ethical dilemmas they have encountered in their day to day work. Please don't forget to make use of our online ethical resources. These include the archaeological **ethics database**, produced by CIfA and our American partners the Register of Professional Archaeologists. It is an invaluable resource which has benefited from far more investment by RPA and CIfA: a by-product of this imbalance is that you can search for material by clauses from the RPA Code but not yet by the CIfA Code of conduct. CIfA is looking for a volunteer or volunteers to help us pull or weight by correlating the resources listed with our Code. This would be a fascinating project for those interested in – or looking for a dissertation topic on – archaeological ethics. If that's you, please contact **admin@archaeologists.net**.

Archaeology Training Forum Award 2019

The ATF Training Award recognises excellence in training, learning and professional development. It is open to organisations and individuals in both the paid and voluntary sectors and aims to promote the value of training to the discipline as a whole. This year the award was presented at the opening address of the CIFA Conference.

The awards were introduced and presented by Robin Turner, Chair of ATF and Head of Survey and Recording at Historic Environment Scotland.

The winner was 'Metal Detecting for Archaeological Projects: An introduction'. Developed to complement and support the successes of the Portable Antiquities Scheme, this work looks to address the lack of archaeological education for detectorists, whilst recognising that the attitudes of some within the interest have prevented change. Keith hopes that rolling out training countrywide will bring closer an ethical and archaeological approach based on stewardship and Codes of Conduct and lead to an Institute of Detectorists. The panel welcomed the project and felt that it would result in a more positive working relationship going forward.

Highly Commended were the 'Where Do You Draw the Line?' workshops designed and delivered to all Archaeology South-East staff by the UCL Equality Diversity and Inclusion manager. They were developed to address problems of staff harassment encountered in the conduct of our archaeological research and fieldwork, and to provide training in skills to identify, negotiate and empower staff to respond and deal collaboratively with such issues. The workshops resulted in a series of positive actions that continue to improve the working environment for both staff and the communities they work with. The panel felt that the training was relevant and engaging and were particularly impressed that attendance was compulsory.




