

Why should you become accredited if you work for a Registered Organisation?

CIfA, like other professional institutes in different sectors, accredits both companies and individuals. As a result, we're sometimes asked why do we need both?

Archaeology is usually not regulated by government, so CIfA helps the profession regulate itself. Through professional accreditation (PCIfA, ACIfA, MCIfA) we support archaeologists in demonstrating their skills, experience, and commitment to good practice. We set, promote and measure compliance with standards, providing quality assurance for the profession. To do this, we need to provide standards for people, processes and products.

The standards for processes and products are found in our 13 *Standards and guidance* documents. Our standards for people are delivered through individual accreditation and organisational registration, helping individuals and employers show that they meet recognised benchmarks of competence and professionalism.

By becoming accredited, you join a network of thousands of professional archaeologists committed to high standards and enhancing their careers.

Registered Organisations

In archaeology, as in other professions, those who require archaeological input generally engage organisations through contracts or other formal agreements. By accrediting (registering) an organisation, CIfA assesses and endorses its ability to deliver high-quality processes and outcomes. This accreditation gives confidence to those who rely on or benefit from its services, providing assurance that the organisation meets professional standards and can be trusted by service users, the profession and the wider public.

A Registered Organisation is expected to be made up of skilled individuals who can make informed, ethical decisions. When staff have individually demonstrated their competence and commitment to professional practice, CIfA, the organisation itself, and those engaging with its work can be confident that high standards will be met consistently.

Individual accreditation

Individual accreditation recognises the skills, competence and understanding of a person; in short, it's about **you**. It is an endorsement of your own **personal** achievements.

Accreditation is an important investment for your career, enhancing your reputation, opportunities and connection to the profession. It shows that your expertise has been

recognised by peers and reflects your professional dedication and commitment to ethical practice. The application process itself helps you to reflect on the skills and knowledge you have gained, as well as areas which need continued development to reach the next grade of accreditation.

Being accredited sets you apart as someone who has agreed to follow an agreed code of conduct and professional standards, regardless of whether the organisation you work for is registered. Individual accreditation supports high standards across the profession and helps give archaeologists a stronger collective voice.
