### 'Lost' Elizabethan manor house in Devon features on Digging of Britain

A long-lost manor house at Columbjohn, Devon, has been relocated by the University of Exeter as part of their annual field school, featured in Episode 6 of the new series of Digging for Britain, scheduled for broadcast on BBC Two on Thursday 16 January at 8pm, or <u>available to watch now on BBC iPlayer.</u>

Working in partnership with the National Trust at Killerton, the excavations were undertaken by students and volunteers in May - June 2024. The manor house was built in around 1580 and occupied for around 100 years by the Acland family, before they moved to the main house at Killerton, but its exact location was unknown. Following survey, the excavations uncovered a cobbled courtyard, two ranges of buildings, parts of a demolished outer precinct wall and a probable sunken garden.

"The buildings were much better preserved than expected, with intact floors and many finds indicating high-status occupation, including dress pins, buttons, a bone comb, a wine glass stem and a pipe tamper signet ring," said lead archaeologist at the University of Exeter, Susan Greaney MCIfA. The team hope to return this summer to understand more about the overall layout of the buildings.

## CIfA members highlight damage to scheduled monuments in Wales by off-roaders

The problem of damage to the historic environment caused by off-road bikers is highlighted in a <u>news story on BBC News Online</u> by Claudine Gerrard, MCIfA of Registered Organisation Heneb: the Trust for Welsh Archaeology, and Jon Berry MCIfA, Chair of the CIfA Cymru/Wales Group and Senior Inspector of Ancient Monuments & Archaeology at Cadw.

Claudine and Jon emphasise the benefits of partnership working between Heneb, Cadw, local authorities and the police to tackle the issue. Wales has introduced new legislation to make it easier to prosecute unlawful damage to scheduled monuments and, in recent years, <u>Operation Heritage Cymru</u> – a neighbourhood watch scheme for ancient monuments – has been launched and is delivering good results.

CIfA formed a new <u>Heritage Crime Special Interest Group</u> in 2023, which is open to all CIfA members with an interest in heritage crime, and non-members can also join the group for £10 per year.

#### **Archaeologists in the New Year's Honours List**

Professor Timothy Insoll, founder and Director of the University of Exeter's Centre for Islamic Archaeology, <u>has been awarded an OBE in the New Year's Honours List</u> for his work over the past 25 years in Bahrain.

#### Update on the 2024 salary benchmarking report

The <u>interim salary benchmarking report</u> was published last October. Since then, the Project Advisory Group has been working to complete the final report for the 2023-24 financial year, which will be circulated to members very shortly.

Alongside this, a working group of CIfA's Board of Directors is focusing on aligning and implementing the two resolutions passed by members at the April 2024 EGM, and Advisory Council is working on a sector survey to enable a more detailed understanding of the issues and concerns facing the sector. We will keep you updated on progress with all three areas of work over the coming weeks.

#### State of the Market Survey 2024

CIfA and FAME (Federation of Archaeological Managers and Employers) are requesting help from archaeological employers, large and small, and independent consultants, to gather data for their annual State of the Market Survey for the year ending 31 March 2024 (31 December 2024 in Ireland). To take part in the survey, follow this link.

The survey provides a wealth of information on the size and nature of the archaeology market in the UK, and its contribution to the wider economy, supporting work to forecast future demand for archaeological services. Data collected from the survey deepens CIfA's understanding of the sector, which helps us target resources and support for our members and Registered Organisations, as well as highlighting the valuable contribution archaeology makes to society.

The State of the Market survey is also an important source of data to support CIfA's skills advocacy in the heritage sector, and for understanding skills gaps and needs, informing our support for the sector in meeting those needs.

The more contributors we have to the survey, the more accurate and useful the data, so please take the time to add your voice to it. The closing date for the survey is Sunday 2 February 2025, and results will be published later in the year.

New draft resource for those involved in preparing & transferring archaeological archives for England

A new Toolkit (currently in draft) has just launched. Developed by Historic England (derived from Queens Counsel legal advice) as part of the <u>Future for Archaeological Archives Programme</u>, of which CIfA is a member, the Toolkit for Managing the Ownership of Archaeological Finds in England can be accessed here.

This Toolkit is designed as an important new resource for individuals involved in the management, recovery, and archiving of archaeological materials. It offers guidelines to ensure the secure and legal transfer of ownership of archaeological material, thereby supporting effective archival practices and planning policy.
